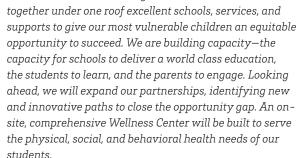

### Together, we are better able to **NURTURE THE WHOLE CHILD**.



Our first core value demonstrates our commitment to each and every child's physical, social, and emotional well-being. We made great progress this year with substantial expansion and improvement in student nutrition. Not only do we serve the 1,100 students in our building, we provide meal service to two nearby charter schools, serve breakfast and lunch to our community, and lunch to children attending YMCA summer camps.

### HEALTHY MIND

Food quality matters in child nutrition and we have transformed our menus. We serve only whole grains, low sugar snacks, and fresh or frozen fruits and vegetables. We also provide students with fresh fruits and vegetable snacks through the USDA's healthy snack program.

### SAFE AND INSPIRING FACILITIES

The physical safety of our children begins with a safe and friendly place to go to school. This past year we enhanced our security preparedness by installing additional security measures and focusing on training school staff in emergency preparedness.

### ACCOMMODATING AND RENEWED SPACES

We also began a \$1.3 million elevator modernization project to enhance the performance of our five 20year old passenger elevators.

### SUPPORTING BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

With more than 50% of our children coping with significant trauma in their lives, emotional and behavioral health supports are crucial. We have begun identifying needs and solutions. Looking forward to next year, we will engage additional partners to expand mental health services and supports available to our students and their families.

### **ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE**

We are committed to every child's academic success. We believe that all students can learn, and that each child learns in different ways and at a different rate. All students receive a rigorous, rich and engaging curriculum, toward our shared mission of closing the opportunity gap.



### Together, we are better able to **INCREASE CAPACITY OF EXCELLENT SCHOOLS**

### CO-LOCATION AND FULL OPERATIONAL SUPPORT

Through our co-location, shared services model, we take the burden and worry of non-academic school operations from the schools. In addition to providing breakfast, lunch, and dinner to the students, we provide state of the art security, including a school resource officer, and full building maintenance services. An investment in a point of sale system improved overall efficiency of our food service operations. As a result, schools experience much lower operating costs than stand-alone schools, preserving valuable resources for the classroom.

### SAVING MONEY TO INVEST IN SCHOOL PROGRAMMING

We continued our progress of finding more and better ways of operating and managing the building. Every dime we save in building operations is reinvested in supporting the schools. We significantly cut our carbon footprint and reduced expenses this past year by reducing our energy costs by 12% and reducing waste by 13%.

### INNOVATION AND COLLABORATION

School capacity was expanded by finding new and innovative ways to help students and their families. Partnering with Springboard Collaborative brought a highly successful literacy program to the CEB. 211 students and families participated in the 6-week program that included literacy instruction for students, workshops for parents, and training and coaching for teachers. As a result, students gained 5.3 months of reading growth.



#### LIBRARY

We expanded our library programming this year by building out a new makerspace made possible through grants from the Kutz Foundation and the Fanz Foundation. In 2019, we will expand this early STEM introduction by offering middle schools STEM and Robotics programs.

# An important part of the CEB's mission is to build family capacity to engage in their child's education.

This means helping the family meet critical needs, hosting parent education around financial literacy, computer literacy, drug and alcohol awareness, nutrition, and connecting families with supports and services offered by other partners and agencies.

### **FOOD PANTRY**

Through the continued generosity of the Harry K Foundation and the Delaware Food Bank, the CEB food pantry provides food and necessities to approximately 100 families each month year around. A grant from the Fanz Foundation allowed us to purchase an additional refrigerator this year, allowing us to offer a wider choice of perishable foods to our families.

### UNIFORM EXCHANGE

We are also a Community
Partner with the Department
of Health and Social Services,
providing families with easy
access to the supports and
programs offered by DHSS.
This year we began a school
uniform bank and exchange.
We accept donated school
uniforms from children who
have outgrown them, clean
and organize them so that
they can be used by other
children.

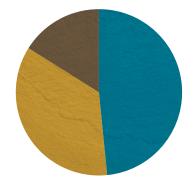

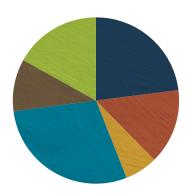
